You Do You

How often have we heard these words, said these words? What do we mean when we say them? I think it can mean different things to different people. For me personally, it means I'm done with whatever is going on. The person I am speaking to has ceased to listen to my logic no matter how convoluted it might be. Others take it as permission to do a thing that isn't normal. For instance, it can be something that isn't illegal but isn't helpful. Way back in Genesis there is an incident that happens between God and Cain. After Cain kills Abel, God asks Cain, "Where is your brother?" And Cain responds, "I do not know; am my brother's keeper?" And as the account goes God confronts Cain on his actions of murder of his brother and Cain is sent away from working the earth. He is forbidden from it.

This phrase, "Am I my brother's keeper" is of the spirit and ilk of saying "you do you." Instead of a blatant lie to hide a murder, we commit a sin of omission. No longer would it have the excuse to let a brother or sister be devoured oh, so slowly by the acid of whatever thing that has ensnared them. It means investing time and energy into someone who will probably return very little of it and may even return none of it. It also means I am doing the things that I want to do and disregarding the wisdom of the Lord given through faithful people. I have to pause, listen and self-examine is this thing I do in accordance with all righteousness.

What is the example our Lord Jesus gives us? Does he say when entering into the messy lives of ours, "you do you?" No, He does not. He says stop, don't do that, turn back to Me! He reaches out his scarred hands to grasp us in an embrace. He calls us to return to the safety that is in him. He calls us to act in love toward our neighbor to gently restore them to the community of believers. Our Lord keeps us in his hands. Instead of "you do you," "be Jesus, give Jesus."

Giving Up or Giving?

Here's a question I used to hear frequently this time of year: "What are you giving up for Lent?" Fasting used to be the norm during Lent for many people of varied religious beliefs. Every year, I was faithful to it. However, one day I realized my personal fasting tradition had actually become self-serving rather than moving into a deeper relationship with my Lord. I had myself convinced; I had myself fooled!

The most common things to "give up" are chocolate, sweets, cigarettes, and alcohol. Yep, Lent is a great time to lose weight or give up an unhealthy habit. Self-serving indeed. Then Lent seemed to take on a Giving trend: donating to a charity, helping at a soup kitchen or any manner of helping others in need. All good things, but is there an element of self-serving lurking just below the surface?

How about this focus? Why not begin a new habit of giving for forty days that would be a positive witness for Christ? One idea to consider is giving up 40 minutes of screen time each day. Use that time to make a phone call, send an email, or a personal note to a member of your family or church family, a neighbor or coworker. There are so many who are lonely, discouraged or in pain.

We may think our seemingly ordinary lives, and our place in God's plans, seem insignificant. We may think, "What can one person do that will really matter?" Look to the Bible. It is full of accounts of ordinary people who become part of God's great story. There are also plenty of people doing good works that touch other lives and perhaps influences their faith in profound ways. If possible, thank them in person, or with a phone call or a personal note.

You may not recognize the unique and important ways that you have been a blessing for the faith and life of others through the years. But God knows, and that's all that matters. As you continue to let the Word of Christ fill your heart and mind and life with the riches of his grace, the Holy Spirit will help you realize that your seemingly ordinary life is, in fact, a sacred life that is playing a necessary and important a role in the fulfillment of God's plans and promises.

When You Want To Get off the Worry Wheel

"But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope ..." Lamentations 3:21 (ESV)

What do we do when negative thoughts threaten to take over?

In his suffering, the writer of Lamentations said, "My soul continually remembers it" (Lamentations 3:20, ESV). Negative thoughts are like a ride at the fair, spinning around and around — except this worry wheel isn't fun and doesn't plan to stop.

Then the poet made one small shift in a different direction: "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope ..." (Lamentations 3:21). That verse changes everything. It says God doesn't leave us helpless to spiral in negative thoughts. We can direct our brains to choose a different path. We can "call to mind" hope (Lamentations 3:21) and train our brains toward better thought patterns.

What might this look like for us today? Lamentations says:

- We can recall the "steadfast love of the LORD," which "never ceases." (Lamentations 3:22, ESV).
 Worry has no memory of good moments. It skips the times God was faithful to us in the past. So to fight back, we can deliberately recall the goodness of God in our past and proclaim it for our future.
- We can ground ourselves in the present. Our minds get stuck when we dwell on the past or fixate on the future, but God's mercies are "new every morning" (Lamentations 3:23, ESV). They are for us today. Maybe you can try saying what you're sensing: "I see the trees God made, feel my sweater, hear birds singing ..." Maybe when your thoughts begin to spiral, you switch to your alphabetical gratitude list: I'm thankful for apples, blankets, coffee ... We can train our brains to come back to today and look for God's goodness here.
- We can declare our eternal reality: "The LORD is my portion" (Lamentations 3:24, ESV). We always have Jesus, both in this life and eternity. Even if the worst does happen, our future remains secure. Sometimes we have to look that spiraling thought in the eyes and say to it, Jesus is my portion. He was, is and always will be enough for me. And you, worry, have no place here. We can fight fear confidently because in Jesus, heaven is already ours.

It is OK to come before God with our honest thoughts and feelings. He loves us and wants to help us step off the spinning wheel of worry, fear or negative memories. When we do step off that ride, standing on the solid ground of God's Truth feels oh so good.

God in heaven, how great and kind You are! You know how our thoughts can get stuck in a negative loop, pulling us down into a pit of despair. Thank You for providing us with tools to retrain our brains to come back to You. We love You. In Jesus' Name, Amen.
